Parents' roles may change as homework assignments get more challenging

Sitting down to help your child with homework is a routine for many parents. But when your child reaches middle school and beyond, homework assignments can become more challenging.

Even though you might not be able to help your tween or teen actually do their homework, you can still provide support, according to Anne Clarkson,



University of Wisconsin-Extension digital parenting education specialist.

Clarkson offers some tips for parents.

-"First, agree on a time and place for homework," she says. "Help your student get organized with a place to study that is quiet with a space to work. Assist your teen in thinking about his or her long-term schedule since middle school assignments often need to be managed over days or weeks."

-Take advantage of online resources. Set up an online calendar or planner to help your teen map out progress and deadlines. Or help your teen search an online learning community or blog centered on a specific subject.

2014-2015 4-H ENROLLMENT

Starting September 3rd, families will be able to log in to 4HOnline to re-enroll for the 2014-2015 4-H year. Instructions for families to re-enroll are now posted at:

NOTE:

If you enrolled last year, DO **NOT** create a new profile. Follow the link on the front page of 4HOnline for re-enrolling directions. If you don't remember your password, click on the "I forgot my password" choice or contact the office and we can reset your password for you.

Getting Started

- 1. Log on to 4HOnline with your family email and password.
- 2. On the family home screen,

click on the orange button labeled "Continue to Fami-Iv".

3. On your Member/Volunteer list, find the family member you wish to re-enroll and click on "Edit" next to their name.

Re-Enroll

- 1. At the bottom of the next screen, click on the button for "Enroll for 2014-2015".
- 2. If the youth is over 17 years old, a box will appear asking if you wish to enroll as a vouth or an adult. If the youth is graduating from 4-H and wants to continue as an adult leader, then choose "Enroll As Adult", otherwise, select "Enroll As Youth"
- 3. You will now see the Person-(Continued on page 4)

al Information that you entered when you first enrolled. Look over the information and make any corrections. **Make sure Emergency Contact information is complete.** If the youth was in 12th grade last year, you must select the grade for this year, either "**Post High School Education**" or "**Not in School**". When you are done, click on "**Continue**".

- 4. Next is the <u>Additional Information</u> screen where you will need to accept the agreements and answer the Photo Release and Accommodations questions. *Please note that the software will not allow the office to accept your enrollment if you have not completed all questions on this page.* Click "**Continue**" when done.
- 5. The <u>Health Form</u> for members is optional at enrollment, but you could be asked to complete it in the future if you attend any events (such as trips or summer camp) that require one. Click "**Continue**" when done.

- 6. If you are an adult volunteer and see the <u>Vol-unteer Screening</u> page, then it has been 4 years since the last time a background check has been completed. You need to check over the answers to the questions and correct as needed. This page will only appear every 4 years. Click "**Continue**" when done.
- On the <u>Participation > Club</u> screen, confirm the correct club is listed. If you serve in a volunteer role (but <u>not</u> as a project leader), click on "Edit" and select the volunteer type. Click on "Update" to save the change. Click on "Continue" when done.
- On the <u>Participation > Projects</u> screen, confirm that all the projects you are enrolled in are listed. Add any missing projects. If you are dropping a project, click on "Edit" for that project and then click on "Delete". (If you are a project leader, this is the screen where you select that volunteer type.) After making sure all your projects are listed correctly, click on "Submit Enrollment".

WINDOW DISPLAY CONTEST

Judging Guidelines

Club window displays are judged on:

- 1. Message. A viewer leaving the exhibit knows something about a 4-H club, UW-Extension, community services, etc., that they did not know before. The message should be clear.
- 2. **Attention grabbing**. Attracts favorable attention to the display.
- 3. **Design**. Elements of the exhibit are placed effectively to give the window a complete and finished look. The message should be a part of the design.
- 4. **Interesting**. The display encourages viewers to seek additional information. Display appeals to the intended audience.
- 5. Workmanship. Neat and well constructed though not necessarily expensive.
- 6. **Originality**. Evidence of creative thought.
- 7. Criteria:
 - Must positively promote 4-H and be creative.

 Must be visible 24/7 (if the business is not open 24/7, the display must be in a window)

4-H News

- Must contain contact information, including the UW-Extension phone number.
- Must have the club name visible.
- Must be up NO LATER than 12:00 pm on Saturday, October 4th and remain up through the last day of National 4-H Week (Saturday, October 11th.)
- The 4-H emblem shall appear whole and not covered by other objects. The tail must point to the right. (This is a Federal law.)

The 2014 National Science Experiment will explore the field of aerospace engineering. The University of Arizona developed the 2014 National Science Experiment: Rockets to the Rescue!

National Youth Science Day will take place on October 8, 2014.

This year, youth will be tasked with the same mission: in light of the recent natural disasters such as Typhoon Haiyan, Nayouth to design and build an aerodynamic food transportation device that can deliver a payload of nutritious food to disaster victims. Youth will learn engineering concepts, develop math skills. learn about nutrition and help solve a relevant, global issue.



4-H Missions in Space: A New Mission

Huntsville, Alabama

Depart Saturday, January 24th return Saturday, January 31st, 2015.

WHAT: A fun-filled educational week at the U.S. Space & Rocket Center in Huntsville, AL. Participants will complete an in depth science experience. They will be part of a 6 hour simulated Space Shuttle/Space Station mission, experience training simulators, be trained as a pilot simulator or in a neutral buoyancy environment. They will tour the U.S. Space & Rocket Center and learn about becoming an astronaut.

WHO: Enrolled 4-H members in good standing in their counties who are in 10th-12th grades may apply. This trip has a limited enrollment with a maximum of 16 students selected from the state. A male and female Adult Advisor will accompany the group of 16 youth on the trip. Applications are due **October** 15th **2014.**

<u>WHY</u>: To have an extended in depth science experience around space, science and technology!

<u>WHEN</u>: Youth and Adults will fly to Huntsville, Alabama on Saturday, January 24th 2015. They will fly home on Saturday, January 31st. A mandatory teleconference orientation is scheduled for **7:00-8:15 pm., Thursday, November, 20**th, 2015 to discuss and transmit travel details. Details will also be provided in a confirmation letter sent out the week of October 20th.

WHERE: U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama. Local airports will be identi-

fied for members when enrollment is closed. The goal being to locate the airports as near as possible to the students. Flights will probably connect to Huntsville through Chicago. Return sites will be the same.

Tentative registration fees including COST: air travel are approximately \$1,100 depending on transportation costs. Final fees will be confirmed and announced in November. Only written cancellations will be accepted. No cancellations can be accepted and no refunds will be issued after November 1. Medical emergencies will be considered for partial refund on a case by case basis. Same-gender substitutions may be made until December 15. In the case of substitutions, applicant will be responsible for ticket reassignment fees unless other arrangements are made. A payment plan has been set up. \$400 is due upon acceptance by October 25th. A second payment of \$400 will be due November **10**th. The third payment will be due **December 10**th for the balance of travel costs estimated to be \$300. Please make all checks payable to "Monroe County 4-H Leaders' Association", and send to the Monroe County 4-H office at 14345 County Rd B, Room 1, Sparta, WI 54656.
