

Want to help youth in your county start thinking about where their food comes from? It is important to understand where the food comes from that you eat each day. You see a wide variety of products in your local grocery store. But where does it all come from? What is the connection to the soil you walk on each day? This poster contest will help you gain a better understanding of the process the food takes.

The annual Conservation Awareness Poster Contest provides kindergarten through twelfth grade students an opportunity to convey their thoughts about soil, water and related natural resource issues through art.

The National Poster Contest theme is "Soil to Spoon." It is important to understand where the food comes from that you eat each day. You see a wide variety of products in your local grocery store. But where does it all come from? What is the connection to the soil you walk on each day? This poster contest will help you gain a better understanding of the process the food takes.

Artwork entered into the national competition must have been judged in a county land conservation poster contest, and/or advanced to an area land and water conservation association sponsored poster contest, and the Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association (WLWCA) sponsored contest.

Poster Categories

Poster category by grade: K-1, 2-3, 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12 The contest is open to public, private or home school students.

All local contests: please fill out the Local Contest Posters to State Contest Form and include it with entries to area or state contests.

State Entries must fill out state to national poster contest form before shipping their posters.

Pr<u>izes</u>

The top two posters in each category of the national contest will receive monetary prizes. First place winners will receive \$100 and second place winners will receive \$75. Prizes at the national level are sponsored by the NACD Auxiliary.

County and Area Poster Contests must be completed on October 26, 2012. The state judging will take place Saturday, November 3, 2012.

It's time to re-enroll for the 2011-2012 4-H Year. 4-H Club Leaders recently received all members re-enrollment forms for youth and adults. Blank forms were given for new members. These forms should have been distributed at your most recent 4-H meeting. If you missed your club meeting, contact your leader to get your forms. If you need extra Leader/New Member Forms, or if there is an error on your re-enrollment form please contact Dani at the UW-Extension office. All forms are due to the Extension office by November 15th - no later!

- Adult Volunteers must re-enroll to keep their certification status in effect. All club project leaders, general leaders, and other volunteers should enroll as a volunteer on the Leader enrollment forms. If you have never done so before, please contact the Extension office to fill out a form.
- Adults who contribute from time to time, but do not attend regular club meetings, may enroll as not club affiliated. This way, clubs will not expect you come to their monthly meetings and contribute on a regular basis. If an adult volunteer is not affiliated with a club but still serves Burnett County 4-H as a leader they are encouraged to enroll as a Volunteer Leader.
- The Cloverbud Program is for 4-H members in grades K-2. As a cloverbud you have the opportunity to explore all of the project areas 4-H has to offer. Cloverbuds enter in the fair under the Cloverbud Division. Cloverbuds are encouraged to attend project meetings according to what interests them. (There are a few other projects you can take concurrently as a Cloverbud these are: Art 1, Aerospace 1, Legos, Latino Cultural Arts, Bicycling 1, Woodworking 1 (Gr. & Up).) As a new 4-Her I encourage you to enroll in Cloverbuds and take a sampling of what else there is available.
- The exploring project is a great project for new members. It is an introductory project similar to cloverbuds, but designed specifically for new members.
- Youth Leaders: consider enrolling as a project leader. If you have talent in a specific project area consider enrolling as a leader. You can plan and lead project meetings and share your skills with younger members by teaching them!
- Adults enrolled as project leaders should hold regular project meetings. These can be for club, or county members. Notify the UWEX office to publicize your project meetings.


TOPIC: For the 2013 essay contest, the essay topic is:

"Reducing the Usage of Bee-Killing Pesticides in my Community."

Pesticides are a fact of modern life, but misuse or overuse of pesticides, or making poor choices then selecting and applying pesticides can be devastating to honey bees and other pollinators. The 4-H'ers are encouraged to learn about bee-killing pesticides being used in their communities – by homeowners, businesses, or farmers. Then, they should investigate how the impact of those pesticides on honey bees can be lessened. The scope of the research is an essential judging criterion, accounting for 40% of your score. The number of sources consulted, the authority of the sources, and the variety of the sources are all evaluated. Personal interviews with beekeepers, farmers and others familiar with the subject are valued sources of information and should be documented. Sources, which are not cited in the endnotes, should be listed in a "Resources" or "Bibliography" list.

*Note that "honey bee" is properly spelled as two words, even though many otherwise authoritative references spell it as one word.

NOTE: ONLY ESSAYS SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY WILL BE ACCEPTED.

Making the Play Dough

Ingredients

- 1 cup of flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of salt
- 1 teaspoon of cream of tartar
- 1 cup of water
- 1 teaspoon of cooking oil
- Food coloring (optional)


Have your child help you measure the ingredients. Talk about using the measuring cup and measuring spoons. Point out that you are using 1 cup of flour and 1 cup of water, the same amount of each. She can help mix the dry ingredients and add the water and oil. Then, he/she can watch while you stir over low heat until the mixture forms a ball.

Add food coloring if you want. If you use color, let your child help choose the color, and talk with him/her about the names of the colors. Knead the dough and let it cool. Store it in a refrigerator in a covered container.

• Add cookie cutters, a dull knife, on a rolling pin to encourage your child's creativity.


