Provide your name, club, grade, category and division, selection title and any technical requirements.



Rules and Guidelines

- Each 4-H member may perform in two events in the contest in addition to a large ensemble event. All clubs are encouraged to bring a large ensemble, as it builds club cohesiveness.
- Solos and small ensembles are limited to three minutes. Advanced piano performers are allotted five minutes. Points will be deducted if contestant goes over the time limit.
- Each entry will consist of one musical selection.
- Each instrumental and piano performer must provide the judge a copy of the music they are performing. ۰
- Voice over tapes or CDs are allowed but strongly discouraged. Please try to use an accompanist or background ٠ music tape or CD. If the singer must use a voice over recording, the singer will need to use a microphone to have his/her voice heard over that of the recorded performer.
- Monetary awards will be given to 1-4th places
- In all divisions, appearance and stage presence will count as part of your score. Remember to dress so that you look

A. INSTRUMENTAL PERFORMANCE: Judged on tone, articulation, rhythm, accuracy, musical value of the piece, and style/musicality.

B. PIANO PERFORMANCE: Judged on rhythm, accuracy, phrasing, degree of difficulty and style/musicality. For pianists who are 6th grade and older, there are three subdivisions; Beginner, Intermediate and Advanced. An Advanced performer should be playing at level six or above in piano literature. Ask your piano teacher if you are not certain of your level.

C. VOCAL PERFORMANCE: Judged on tone, intonation, diction, expression, style, musicality and appropriateness. D. VOCAL PLUS PERFORMANCE: Judging includes movement, choreography, costumes, props, originality and creativity in addition to areas judged in vocal performance.

Read the Contest Rules at www.rocketcontest.org before you begin. ALL INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THE APPLICATION IS REQUIRED.

The Team America Rocketry Challenge is open to the first 1.000 teams that submit a completed application, including payment, postmarked no later than November 30, 2011. Teams must be made up of a minimum of 3 and no more than 10 students who are currently enrolled in grades 7 through 12 in U.S. schools. Team applications must come from a single school, homeschool association, or U.S. incorporated non-profit youth organization (excluding National Association of Rocketry, Tripoli Rocketry Association, or any other rocketry organization). No more than five teams may be entered by any school or sponsoring organization.

Our primary communication with teams is via email, and we post all broadcast e-mails on the website under "Contest Emails." It is your responsibility to provide us with as many valid email addresses as possible to ensure you receive information in a timely manner. Each registered team is required to designate a Student Program Manager as an additional point of contact for all TARC communications. This person will serve as a team leader and will be a main point of contact should any administrative team issues arise.

The official electronic forum (NARTARC Forum) for exchanging information with teams and NAR mentors is located at http://groups.yahoo.com/group/NARTARC/ and requires a Yahoo email address (www.yahoo.com). We STRONGLY recommend all teams establish an email account for their team at Yahoo, provide it in the email addresses section on your application, and join the Forum.

The \$105 registration fee **MUST** be included with the payment form and can only be paid by check, money order, VISA, MasterCard, or America Express. We DO NOT accept purchase orders or issue invoices.

Complete one application per team and mail in a 9 X 12 envelope (please do not fold documents). Incomplete or illegible applications will not be processed and will be returned. This year's application is equipped with the capability to enter information directly into the PDF formatted application forms. We strongly recommend you utilize this feature to avoid delays in processing illegible applications. You will need to have Adobe Acrobat version 7.0 in order to download these forms. Print out a copy of the completed forms for your records as you cannot save a copy of the PDF file.

After your application is processed, your team will be listed at www.rocketcontest.org as a "Registered Team," and a registration confirmation email with very important information will be sent to all the email addresses listed on your application. If you do not receive a registration confirmation email within 24 hours of your team being listed on our website, it probably means your email address is invalid or we have incorrectly entered it into our database. Qualifying flight scores must be faxed to (703) 358-1133 by April 2, 2012. The 100 finalists will be posted at www.rocketcontest.org on April 6, 2012. The finals will be held on May 12, 2012 at Great Meadow, The Plains, Virginia.

If you plan to attend, please pre-register by calling the Extension Office. (349-2151) In order to be recognized as a 4-H volunteer leader in the Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development program, all adults age 18 years and over must participate in the Youth Protection Program.

The Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development Youth Protection program process includes:

- A. Completion of the Volunteer Application Form
- **B.** Background records check for arrest and conviction records
- C. Participation in volunteer orientation
- D. Completion of the 4-H Enrollment Form with the Volunteer Behavior **Expectations**

To continue to be recognized as a 4-H volunteer leader in the Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development program beyond the first year, all adults 18 years of age and over must annually complete a 4-H Enrollment Form with Volunteer Behavior Expectations. A background records check for arrest and conviction records will be completed every four years for continuing 4-H volunteer leaders.

Returning volunteers who have been absent one to four years need the background records check, signed Volunteer Behavior Expectations form, but are not required to attend the orientation to be reinstated as a volunteer.

Returning volunteers who have been absent five or more years need to repeat the entire Youth Protection process.

By completing the Volunteer Youth Protection process, volunteers are able to hold meetings, serve as club adult leaders, chaperone events and more! Volunteers are essential to the success of the Burnett County 4-H program. Thank You!!

SPACE CAMP **4-H Missions in Space** Huntsville, Alabama April 19-23 2012



WHAT: A fun-filled educational weekend at the U.S. Space & Rocket Center in Huntsville, AL: participants will complete a simulated Space Shuttle mission, experience training simulators, tour the U.S. Space & Rocket Center and learn about becoming an astronaut.

- WHO: Enrolled 4-H members in good standing in their counties who are in grades 6-8 may apply. Adult Advisors will be selected at a ratio of one per ten youth to accompany the group of 100+ youth on the trip. (Interested adults should ask their county 4-H office staff for a State & National Adult Leader Application, due March 1. All adult leaders must be certified Wisconsin 4-H leaders over 21 years of age. Mandatory Adult Leader training workshop will be held March 31, 2012 in Madison.
- WHY: Explore the fascinating world of space exploration, space science and technology!
- WHEN: Departure will be morning on Thursday and return to Wisconsin early Monday. A mandatory teleconference orientation is scheduled for 7:00-8:20 pm., Tuesday, March 8, 2012. Details will be provided with a confirmation letter and on the State 4-H website (http://www.uwex.edu/ces/4h/events/spacecamp/index.cfm). An optional workshop has been scheduled for 1:30–3:30 p.m., Saturday, March 31, at UW Space Place (Madison, WI) so delegates can meet others from their mission and experience hands-on space exploration activities prior to travel.
- WHERE: U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama. A motor coach will make pickups at Eau Claire, Wausau, Madison and Milwaukee before traveling overnight to Huntsville. Return sites are the same.
- COST: Tentative registration fees including coach travel are approximately \$475-500 depending on transportation costs. Final fees will be confirmed and announced in February. Only written cancellations will be accepted. No cancellations can be accepted and no refunds will be issued after February 1. Medical emergencies will be considered for partial refund on a case by case basis. Same-gender substitutions may be made until March 1. Payment is due to your county 4-H office by March 15 written payable to UW-Ext.
- HOW: Call your county UW Extension 4-H/Youth Development office or go on-line to the Wisconsin 4-H website to obtain a Space Camp (Pathfinder Mission) application. All selections for applicants are made within counties. The completed application must be postmarked to your county Extension 4-H Youth Development office prior to December 1. Priority selection will be given to first time applicants; alumni are welcome to apply and will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis after registration closes on January 14. ALL applicants will be notified of their status (confirmed or on waiting list) shortly thereafter. An expectation form and a health form are due February 1.

Program details: During this program, you will travel on a motor coach; sleep overnight on the coach on the return trip; eat in restaurants and a camp cafeteria, share same-gender sleeping and restroom facilities, sleep in double or bunk beds, work with a team of 12-15 similar aged youth to help them solve problems, and read a script aloud during a mock space mission under the guidance of an adult advisor. Youth will be under the direct supervision of adult 4-H volunteers, Wisconsin 4-H staff, Space Camp staff adult counselors and WI 4-H youth counselors. Adult Advisors are assigned at a ratio of 1:10 youth. A Youth Counselor will be assigned to each youth camper lodging room; at least one adult of the same gender will be housed per floor. Both genders will be housed on the same floor. The health staff is a Wisconsin 4-H adult volunteer who has first aid/CPR training. Participants may be able to experience some or all of the following activities: train like the pioneers of Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo; tumble and spin in a Multi-Axis Trainer; float on air in a 5-Degrees of Freedom Chair; walk like Apollo astronauts in a 1/6th Gravity Chair; experience a world without friction in the MMU - Manned Maneuvering Unit; explore the past, present and future of space flight; and experience a giant screen IMAX® theater. Activities may also include large group games and running which allow personal contact with other campers; walking or standing for several hours on concrete floors or sidewalks; climbing on an indoor climbing wall with safety equipment; swimming in a hotel pool with non-lifeguard trained Adult Advisors present; writing; public speaking; and performing skits. WISCONSIN 4-H YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAMS TO JAPAN. KOREA. **ARGENTINA & MEXICO**

Wisconsin 4-H youth between the ages of 12-18 (15-18 for Argentina) have an amazing opportunity to stay with and become part of a host family, experiencing daily life and culture in Argentina, Mexico, Japan, or Korea firsthand for one month in the summer. Cost is estimated at \$2,000-\$4,200. An optional 4week intensive Nihongo (Japanese language) program can be added. Participants are responsible for all costs. Year-long internships in Japan also exist for young adult leaders who are exchange alumni.

4-H YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAMS TO AUSTRALIA, COSTA RICA AND NORWAY

4-H'ers between the ages of 16-19) are also able to participate in a home stay exchange experience in Costa Rica, Australia, or, on even numbered years, Norway. Anticipate a rural experience! Participants are responsible for all costs; about \$5,100 for Australia; \$2,900 for Costa Rica and \$4,300 for Norway.

Applications are due January 1. County/area and national selection committees must approve applicants. WI 4-H requires that at least \$1000 be raised through individual fund raising with a local International Programs Committee; the participant pays the balance.

HOSTING OPPORTUNITIES

Hosting is a unique opportunity for both rural and urban 4-H families to host a visitor from another country.

During the summer, Wisconsin 4-H families welcome 12-17 year old Japanese. Korean. Costa Rican, Mexican, and Norwegian delegates or their adult chaperones into their homes for one month (July-August).

Opportunities also exist for hosting Japanese or Eurasian students for the school year. Students between the ages of 15-18 study in Wisconsin high schools while living with a host family for ten months to improve their English, learn about American culture, and become part of an American family.

Applications are due in late winter/early sprina.
