

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A Note from the Agent -

Beth Johnson

Each of the Essential Elements of Positive Youth Development

is vital to the growth and development of youth. It is the combination of the elements that creates a positive environment for youth development to occur. By intentionally including these elements in a 4-H club or project meeting, youth have the ability to participate experientially in activities and events, feel nurtured in a safe environment, master new skills and abilities, and feel that they are contributing to their club and community in a positive way. To help us gain awareness of how to incorporate the Essential Elements, we will explore each element in the next few monthly newsletters.



Have a future orientation is when you have something to look forward to. In a simple sense, it means going to camp and seeing the possibilities of becoming a CIT and then camp counselor. It is about having a chance to try out new roles in a safe environment. It also encompasses learning skills that are applicable to a chosen career path. 4-H participation should directly (through developing an interest in a project that leads to a career) and indirectly (by developing good communication and teamwork skills) prepare youth for future careers.

We want to encourage youth to gain independence which will improve self-confidence in one's ability to succeed. One of the most difficult tasks for youth is learning to set attainable goals and define realistic strategies to reaching them. As adults, we have more practice at this and we also set goals for our youth. They may be goals that if we help them develop into responsible young adults they may go on to college and/or obtain a good paying job so they may be independent of us.

One challenge for adults is helping youth recognize and explore the multitude of opportunities available to them and to match these with their skills, interests, and aptitudes. Being “futuristic” means making decisions today based on a positive belief about the future. Positive environments provide opportunities for young people to see themselves in the future which allows for the development of independence and self-responsibility.

Ways that adults can support youth in gaining independence and responsibility include:

- Encouraging youth to think positively about their future
- Helping youth set goals for themselves 5-10 years in the future that are challenging, yet achievable
- Providing opportunities for youth to realize some of their goals through project work and club work
- Giving youth opportunities to develop ideas and see them through to completion
- Creating club excitement about a future activity or opportunity
- Acting more as “guides on the side” rather than the “sage on the stage”
- Avoiding the tendency to solve problems for youth.

FAIR EXHIBITING

WHOSE EXHIBIT IS IT . . . REALLY?

Fair exhibits are to be made by the youth exhibiting them. The exhibit should be the result of learning in the project throughout the year. Youth themselves, and what they have learned, are far more important than the items they make or grow.

Parents, please do project work with your child, not for your child! Your child needs your interest, enthusiasm, advice, and help, but with that support they need to do the project themselves.

Please remember, youth do not gain if they:

- ♦ Purchase an item and show it as though it is a project they have made.
- ♦ Show a project made by another family member.
- ♦ Bring plants they did not grow, vegetables they did not plant or weed, animals they did not care for, etc.
- ♦ Exhibit a project they have shown in a previous year.

Parents - please "sit on your hands," allowing your child to make and exhibit their own work, even if it does not meet your standards or quality of excellence.

SOME FACE-TO-FACE JUDGING QUESTIONS

- ★ What do you like most about this project?
- ★ What do you like least about this project?
- ★ What have you learned in this project?
- ★ What would you like to learn more about in this project?
- ★ Where did you get the idea for this exhibit?
- ★ Where/how did you learn to make this exhibit? Who helped you?
- ★ What was the easiest part of making this exhibit?
- ★ What was the most difficult or challenging part of making this exhibit?
- ★ What would you do differently if you were to make a similar exhibit again?

TYPES OF FAIR JUDGING

Face-to-Face Judging. Face-to-face judging of certain fair projects is performed to help exhibitors learn the strengths and weaknesses of their project directly from the judge. Exhibitors report to the judge with their projects at the designated time. They meet face-to-face with the judge, who learns more about the work the exhibitor put into the entry while the judge evaluates it. Exhibitors then receive a ribbon for the quality of the exhibit & knowledge of their project, as well as new information they can use to do better next year. Cloverbuds will receive a Participation Ribbon for all projects judged.

Danish Judging. The Danish system of judging provides more exhibitors a chance to receive a ribbon for their entries. Instead of placing only the best four exhibits and giving them a blue, red, white, or pink ribbon (like in Open Class) all entries are placed. All entries receive a premium and ribbon. The number of blue, red, white, and pink ribbons a judge hands out in any color group depends on the number of entries in the class. For example, if there are 8 entries in a class, up to 2 can receive a blue rating, up to 4 red ratings, up to 6 white ratings, and up to 8 pink ratings.

Conference Judging. Conference judging is a combination of face-to-face and Danish judging. In conference style judging, the exhibitors and exhibits come before the judge by Class. The judge may ask youth questions about their project and use the knowledge as well as the quality of the exhibit to place the entries according to the Danish method of placing.

YOUNG EAGLES FLIGHTS

August 23 | Burnett County Airport, Siren WI

Since 1992, Young Eagles flights have been safely conducted in nearly every type of general aviation aircraft, from light planes to business jets, and everything in between.

What is EAA?

EAA, the Experimental Aircraft Association, is an international aviation membership association founded in 1953 and headquartered in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Local chapters are located in all 50 states and many countries. Members are aviation enthusiasts of every age group, including many airline and commercial pilots, engineers, business people and even astronauts. They enjoy all types of airplanes, including "experimental" aircraft, those aircraft built by individual craftsmen, rather than in a factory. "Experimental" refers to the category of aircraft designed by the FAA for these types of airplanes. Similar to standard category aircraft, Experimental aircraft are inspected and certified airworthy by FAA.

Why was the EAA Young Eagles program developed?

The EAA Young Eagles Program was developed in 1992 to welcome young people into the world of aviation. Aviation is exciting and vital to our nation's future and the best way to convey that message is to actually experience flight in a first-hand setting.

What do you hope to gain by taking my child flying?

Each Young Eagle will experience a safe and enjoyable flight that will give them new perspectives on the world and life in general. Young Eagles program participants will understand that an indi-

vidual's potential is unlimited and for them, the sky is the limit!

Who are the pilots?

The pilots participating in the Young Eagles program are local members of EAA who are volunteering their time and aircraft to make your child's flight possible. Each pilot is licensed by the FAA (or governing organization outside the U.S., such as Transport Canada) and all aircraft are likewise licensed by the government. The flights are conducted according to federal regulations. No aerobatic maneuvers are performed.

How does my child become a Young Eagle?

If your child is between the ages of 8 and 17, you may sign up your child for a flight at the Gandy Dancer Fly In / Drive In on July 26. As a parent, you'll need to complete a Young Eagle registration form that is available from your pilot. They can help you fill out the form and answer any other specific questions you may have.

What will the flight be like?

Your pilot will explain what will happen during the flight. Once in the air, your child will see the earth and sky in a new and exciting way. Most Young Eagle flights last between 15 and 20 minutes. Back on the ground, there will be additional time for questions after the flight. After the flight is completed, the pilot will issue your child the official EAA Young Eagles logbook or certificate.

JORDAN BUCK KINETIC SCULPTURE

2014 is the 100th anniversary of Jim Jordan's harvest of a white-tail whose antler rack measured 206 1/8, a world record for 80 years. The deer was taken south of Danbury near the railroad that has become the Gandy Dancer Trail.

The Jordan Buck Puppet Project is a community art project that is one component of the Jordan Buck Centennial Celebrations.

Artist Chris Lutter and Burnett County volunteers will construct the larger-than-life whitetail August 18-23 at In a New Light Gallery, south of Webster on Highway 35. Chris will also train volunteers to animate the buck so it is life-like in movement.


The puppet will be unveiled at the annual White-tails Unlimited banquet on September 20 in Siren and will also appear in other Centennial events. The kinetic sculpture (a three-dimensional moving figure) will then belong to the county to use at community events, parades, public display, and educational purposes.

The process will be filmed for a short documentary.

YOU may get involved in this project by becoming a builder. The Jordan Buck Puppet Project also needs athletic young men and women with

upper body strength, strong legs, and a willingness to learn the performance art of kinetic sculpture to bring the buck to life.



We were very happy to welcome Alex and Kate Peterson to the project meeting and are looking forward to building with them in the future!








Craig's club meets the **first Sunday** of every month at noon at the Grantsburg airport. The meetings are weather dependent so be sure to call him before you go.

The next meeting will be held on July 1 at 7:00 pm in the Government Center.













Step 1.
Use a sheet of 8 1/2-by-11 inch paper. Fold the paper in half lengthwise and run thumbnail along the fold to crease it sharply. Now, unfold the paper.

Step 2
Fold down the top corners as indicated by the arrows.

Step 3
Fold the two edges toward the center line, as indicated.

Step 4.
Make a valley fold in half. Turn the plane 90 degrees as shown in figure of Step 5.

Step 5
Create a wing crease that begins at the nose as shown.

Step 6.
Form 3-dimensional shape as shown in figure. The Basic Dart is complete. Bend up the tailing edge of the wings for lift if it has a tendency to nose-dive.
