Spooner Sheep Day

The 61st Spooner Sheep Day will be held at the Spooner Agricultural Research Station on Saturday, August17, 2013. The Spooner Sheep Day has a long tradition of providing useful information to the state's sheep producers and is the longest-running agricultural field day of the many held each year by the University of Wisconsin-Madison, College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

Registration will begin at the station headquarters at 9:00 a.m. with the program ending at approximately 2:30 p.m. This year's program will present some exciting new information on a commercial genetic test for susceptibility to disease. A new breed of sheep, Awassi, has been introduced into the U.S. by Larry Meisegeier on his farm near Bruce, WI, and he will talk about his experiences. Also, short presentations of other current research projects from the UW-Madison sheep research program will be presented. A delicious lamb lunch will be served at noon at a cost of \$8.00 per adult, \$5.00 for children ages 5 to 11, and free for children under 5. Advanced reservations are not required. Statewide Training for 4-H Photo Leaders & Judges

Please mark your calendars for "Foto Follies 2013," a statewide training program for Wisconsin 4-H youth and adult photo leaders and county fair judges, to be held Sept. 13-15, at Upham Woods Environmental Education Center, Wisconsin Dells.

The conference begins with registration at 6 p.m. on Friday and ends at 11:30 a.m. on Sunday. It will feature a variety of sessions for adult and youth 4-H photo leaders, as well as training for those who want to be registered as county fair photography judges.

The conference costs \$80 per person if you stay in the lodge, and \$76 if you stay in a cabin. This fee will cover five workshop sessions; keynote talk by Daniel Johnson, author of the 4-H Guide to Digital Photography: personal photo critiques; morning photo walks; evening photo activities; two breakfasts, a lunch and a dinner: two nights lodging in a dorm or cabin; and all program materials. All youth leaders must be at least in high school starting in the fall of 2013 and accompanied by an adult.

Registration deadline is Monday, Aug. 5, 2013, and space is limited so you will want to register as soon as possible.

For adult and youth 4-H photo volunteers, the conference will

focus on ideas and information on how you can be an effective leader, with an emphasis on resources and fun activities for teaching photography to young people and demonstrating how they can help their communities through photography.

You'll also have many opportunities to practice and improve your own photo-taking skills. Photo skills workshop choices include: getting to know your digital camera; how to make the most of your digital camera; taking candid photos of people and animals; how to make your best photo even better through photo editing; portraiture and lighting; photo composition and design; smart phone photography; still life photography; video storytelling; and outdoor photography.

Training for new and aspiring judges will cover the basics of Danish and conference judging photos at Wisconsin county fairs. You can use this opportunity to polish your judging skills or to become registered as a Dept. 20 county fair judge.

Students will learn what makes a prairie community, how the prairies of Crex were formed and maintained, and what species make the prairie their home. This session will feature a hands – on opportunity to analyze and collect species from one of Wisconsin's rarest remaining ecosystems. Make a field guide to carry with you on your adventure!

Tuesday, August 13th Animals Undercover

Students will identify common signs wildlife leave behind. Use of mounted animals and pelts will help students differentiate between various kinds of wildlife. 

WOULD YOUR YOUTH LIKE TO OBSERVE THE UNIVERSE WITH REAL RESEARCH TELESCOPES?

We thought so! So, a group of dedicated scientists and astronomy educators created Skynet Junior Scholars. With a simple internet connection, young people can conduct all kinds of astronomy investigations with world-class telescopes in the US, Chile AND Australia. Suitable

for middle school and older youth in 4-H clubs, afterschool and museum programs, Skynet Junior Scholars (SJS) offers:

- Access to Skynet Robotic Telescopes;
- Explorations: a series of inquiry -based STEM activities that engage young people in a variety of astronomy topics;
- Online web-portal allows youth to create an image gallery, share data with other young scientists, publish their results;
- Communication with astronomers, engineers, software developers and SJS staff;
- An opportunity for youth to advance, and assist astronomers with their projects.

Youth in your out-of-school-time programs may participate in SJS after you complete the SJS professional development workshop. In addition to your time and talent, participation in the project requires:

1) Your willingness to guide 5-10 youth

through an SJS Exploration by May, 2014. Youth participants need access to reliable internet for the telescope activities, which can be pursued on their own. But we will rely on you to hold group discussions, and conduct activities in an out-of-school or club setting.


