Support for Parents of Tweens and Teens

As young teens begin to push the limits and test their boundaries, parents can feel overwhelmed and question their parenting ability. "Even though their children don't require the same sort

of hands-on attention that they did when they were small, parents of adolescents face different, but equally demanding, challenges than they did when their children were younger," states Stephen Small, human development and family relations specialist with the UW-Extension and UW-Madison. In response to the need for online parenting opportunities for parents of preteens and teens, family scholars from the University of Wisconsin Cooperative Extension have developed a new website and program called Parenthetical (www.myparenthetical.com) that

is aimed at parents of tweens and teens throughout the state.

"Parents feel like they should be experienced, and they may feel it's a sign of weakness or lack of parenting ability if they seek help," says Rebecca Mather, outreach specialist with UW-Extension. "However, parents benefit from sharing strategies and the opportunity to process their feelings and information." Parenthetical

combines the functions of a blog, an informational website and a social network. Parents can share problems and ask questions and get the most current information about effective parent-

ing and teens. The site is free and accessible twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

Parenthetical features weekly posts about parenting hot topics that are meant to start conversations among users on the site. "We want the site to include not just the latest research on parenting and teenagers, but also the collected lessons and wisdom of parents," says Anne Clarkson, outreach specialist with UW-Extension. A team of family educators from UW-Madison/UW-Extension will facilitate the site.

Youth Tractor Safety Training

A tractor and machinery certification program is being offered to Burnett, Sawyer and Washburn County youth on Monday June 17, Tuesday 18, and

Thursday 20 at the Spooner Ag Research Station. Successful completion of this course will allow youth ages 12-16 to legally operate tractors or self- propelled implements owned by their immediate family on public roads.

Completing the safety program will also al-

low youth age 14 or 15 to work on a farm other than one owned by their parents, and operate tractors and other machinery.

The course instructors include UW-Extension and Spooner Agriculture Research Station staff, High School Agriculture instructors from Spooner and Shell Lake, and other invited guests. The hours of the course will be from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. Students must be at least 12 years old to enroll in

the program and attendance at all three days' training is required for certification.

Interested youth must pre-register prior to June 17 by contacting the UW-Extension Spooner Agriculture Agents Office at 715-635-

3506 or 1-800-528-1914, and provide their name, age, address, telephone number and social security number. A signed waiver form by the youth's parent or legal guardian is also required to participate in the training. Cost of the course is \$20.00.

Experiential Learning

Letter 6

Dear Volunteer,

Research tells us that we remember only 20% of what we hear, 30% of what we see, and about 50% of what we see and hear. When we are actively involved in doing something and explain it out loud, that retention rate shoots up to 90%. (Dale, 1946)

The 4-H slogan is "learn by doing." Your role as a volunteer involves guiding 4-H members through a thinking process that helps them understand what they learn from doing something. With your assistance, this knowledge can be applied to other facets of their lives and help develop their life skills.

What is Experiential Learning?

Everyone has a preferred learning style or way of learning. Some learn best by listening, some by reading or observing, and some by hands-on experiences. Regardless of one's preferred learning style, experiential learning is an effective approach in helping 4-H members understand and apply new knowledge, attitudes, and skills. The experiential learning process is a five-step method that engages members in an activity, and then guides them to reflect and apply what they have learned. You, the volunteer leader, play a crucial role in guiding members through the five steps in the learning process.

The five steps in the Experiential Learning Process are:

- 1. Experience the activity: perform, do it.
- Share the results, reactions, and observations publicly.
- 3. Process by discussing, analyzing, and reflecting.
- Generalize to connect the experience to realworld examples.
- 5. Apply what was learned to a similar or different situation: practice.

When young people do and apply something they've learned, knowledge gives way to understanding.

Steps in the Experiential Learning Process

Step 1 - Experience: Do It!

The first step in the process is experiencing. This involves 4-H members doing an activity with minimal guidance from an adult. They might be creating an exhibit, playing a game, working on a project, or assuming a leadership responsibility. Often volunteer leaders and teachers spend too much time on the experiencing step and not enough time on the other four steps.

Step 2 - Share: What Happened?

Step two begins the reflecting part of the learning process. The purpose of this step is to have members share their feelings, observations, and reactions to the learning activity just completed. Your role is that of a facilitator drawing information out of the participants.

You can ask them questions like, "What did you see happening?" or "What were you thinking and feeling during the activity?" or "What was new or different in this activity?" or even "Tell me what you did."

Step 3 - Process: What's Important?

In this step, try to focus the members' attention on what was most important about the experience. Draw out the common theme(s) and patterns of behavior your members observed.

For this step you might ask questions such as "What did you learn about yourself by doing this activity?" or "How did the group decide to ____?" or "What problems came up as you were going through this activity?" or "Did you notice any patterns or actions in common among your group members?"

Step 4 – Generalize: So What?

With this step we move from reflection to application. What can we take from this learning activity and apply to other situations? Here, your challenge is to get your members to relate their observations to the outside world.

Good questions to ask for this step are: "What did you learn today that you could apply to other areas of your life?" or "How can you use what you've learned today at home or school?" or "In what other situations have you seen similar reactions or results?"

Step 5 - Apply: Now What?

The final step is really two steps in one. The first part is clarifying how members can use what they've learned in other situations; the second part pertains to the goals they make to use what they've learned.

The best way to be sure members understand and can use what they've learned is to have them tell you. Have them answer the questions, "How do you plan to use what you've learned today?" or "What have you learned that you will apply to other situations?"

You can strengthen the 4-H members' commitment by having them record their plans for what they have learned. Research tells us that learners are more likely to use what they've learned by making a "contract" to do so within a specific period of time. The contract can be oral, in which members say out loud what they will do and when. Or, you can have them write it down and share it with a partner, the group, or with you. If you want to make sure they follow through, collect their written plans and share a verbal or written reminder with them later.

Applying Experiential Learning

With this process you can turn any experience, good or bad, into a learning experience. To make it work effectively, you will need to plan time for reflecting on the experience and prepare questions ahead of time. Listen carefully to the members as they respond to your questions so you can make adjustments and build on their learning. Remember, providing a hands-on learning experience does not create experiential learning—it's just the first step. The learning comes from the thoughts and ideas generated in sharing, processing, generalizing, and applying the experience.

"Tell me, and I will forget. Show me, and I may remember. Involve me, and I will understand." —Confucius

It's a matter of using the group's resources to:

Do an exercise.

Reflect on the immediate feelings and observations derived from that exercise.

Apply what was learned, experienced, and observed to other settings.

A simple way to remember the experiential learning process is **DO – REFLECT – APPLY.**

ACTION STEPS

- Practice using the Experiential Learning
 Process by playing a cooperative game and then processing it as a group.
- Write questions related to the steps of the Experiential Learning Process on a note card and keep it with your 4-H materials. Pull it out after the members experience something and ask them the questions on the card.
