#### MAY IS FOR MOTHERS AND FOR 4-H

Madison, Wis. (May 2019) – Give a Mother's Day gift that keeps giving by ordering a Wisconsin 4-H license plate for your car, truck or motor home. The specialty plate, now available through the Wisconsin Department of Motor Vehicles, supports the Wisconsin 4-H program, and bears the message 4-H Empowering Youth. The sale of the plate includes a fee that goes to the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation.

"This is a great way for our 4-H families, alumni and supporters to show their fierce love of 4-H," says Brenda Scheider, Executive Director for the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation. "Half of the proceeds from every plate sale will go back to the county in which the plate was purchased. The other half will be used for state and regional 4-H programs."

At each plate renewal, 4-H supporters will pay the \$25 donation and the regular registration fee for non-personalized 4-H license plates.

4-H license plates may be personalized by paying a \$15 personalized plate fee each year in addition to the \$25 donation and regular annual registration fee.

# **Cooking with Kids**

These can be challenging times for families that are home with their children all day. Mealtimes are an opportunity to provide active learning and conversation for you and your family. A wonderful way to get kids excited about both learning and nutrition is getting them involved in the meal-making process. Burnett County Extension staff, Beth Rank (Positive Youth Development Educator) and Julie Yezek (Food WIse Educator), want to help set you up for success with some quick tips and reminders.



#### Start with basic food safety:

- Wash hands with soap and water before and after touching food (and before you eat) and wash food prep surfaces. Have young children count to 20 while washing to practice with numbers.
- Keep long hair pulled back and sleeves rolled up.
- Don't let children lick their fingers or put their hands in their mouths, or lick utensils and put them
  back into the food you are cooking. "In my household with two small children, it takes a really
  long time to make something because of all the almost constant reminders to rewash hands after
  the kids lick their fingers," says Beth.

#### Get your kids excited about cooking:

- Show your kids your grocery store's website and have them help pick out ingredients maybe something they haven't tried before like a new fruit or vegetable. If they can, have them write out the shopping list. "For safety reasons right now, I exclusively shop for groceries online at stores that offer delivery to my vehicle," says Julie.
- Help them choose a recipe from your cookbooks or search online, using ingredients you have or know you can purchase.
- While you can focus on healthy meals, let them also select a fun snack to make like popcorn balls or cookies you can bake together. "Our young kids have enjoyed stirring instant pudding, adding the cold water when I make jello, and adding dry ingredients in baking. If a recipe calls for one cup of something, I use ½ cup measure and let each of my two kids add the ingredient," says Beth.

**Assign tasks based on children's age:** For younger kids, some of these tasks can double as learning for school, if age appropriate.


- Math: If you halve or double a recipe, have your child calculate the changes to the
  amounts. Talk about fractions using measuring cups and have them count ingredients like eggs.
- **Science:** Use the internet to look up how baking powder and baking soda work, or what's happening when marshmallows turn golden-brown in the oven.
- **Literacy:** Have your child read the recipe and instructions aloud and follow each step to the final food. This helps improve reading comprehension and expand vocabulary.

**Enjoy family meals:** Plan to eat your meals as a family, whether that is breakfast, lunch or dinner.

- Teach your child how to set the table.
- Have your child help you put food into serving dishes.
- Turn off the TV, put away devices, and sit together for a meal.
- Make it fun! Let the kids choose a theme for dinner or set up a picnic inside or in your yard.
   "Some of our family's favorite memories include having picnics in the living room. I used cookie cutters to make fun sandwiches. The kids loved the handprint sandwiches and they ate one finger at a time," says Julie.
- Use the meal time to talk about the day, remember fun family times and plan for new activities you'd like to do in the future. Enjoy each other!
