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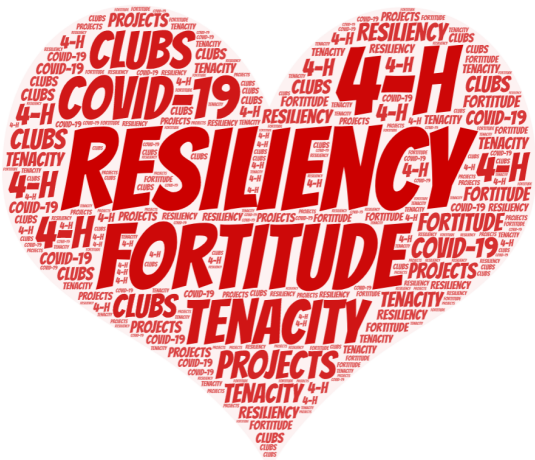
A Note from the Educator -

Recognizing those time constraints, we wanted to extend the deadline to allow for more promotion within your county and and the state arts programs.

The contest is broken into eight categories:

1. Drawing Using Any Medium
2. Painting (acrylic, watercolor or oil)
3. Pottery, Ceramics or Clay
4. Photography
5. Paper
6. Fabric, Yarn or Fiber
7. Wood

8. Any Other Media (ex: digital, metalcraft, jewelry, leatherwork, wax, eggshells, taxidermy, etc.)

A winner will be chosen in each category with a Best of Show Award given to the top entry as chosen by the judging committee. Category winners will be purchased by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation for \$100, with the Best of Show entry receiving an additional \$150. Winners will be notified by email by November 20, and a complete winner's list, as well as photos of the winning entries, will be on the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation website.

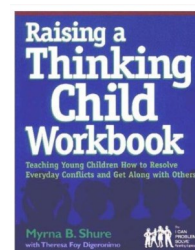
Local Parent Education Offerings

Chain Reaction Building Challenge

A chain reaction is when one event sets off a chain of similar events. Think about a set of dominoes. When you line up dominoes and tip just one over, they knock over the rest. The movement of just one object triggers the movement of another.

In this challenge, a chain reaction (sometimes called a Rube Goldberg Machine) uses different moving parts in order to complete a simple task. An example of a chain reaction would be using a series of simple machines and chain reactions to get a ball from one side of the room to the other (instead of just rolling it). You might use a ramp to move a truck to hit a wall to tip the truck to roll the ball out onto another ramp.



Simple Machine: a mechanical device used to apply increased force. (lever, inclined plane, wedge, pulley, wheel and axle, and screw). Simple machines are used in creating more complex machines. For example, wheels, levers, and pulleys are all part of a bicycle.



The 6 Simple Machines

Lever: a bar that rests on a support to lift or move something.

Inclined plane: any slanting flat surface.

Wedge: an object with a slanted edge that is sharp. Can be used to cut or hold together.

Pulley: uses grooved wheels and rope/chain to raise, lower, or move something.

Wheel and axle: a wheel turning on a rod to lift/move something.

Screw: inclined planes wrapped around a pole to hold something together.

The Challenge: a chain reaction that pours

Your Challenge: Using a variety of simple machines and anything you have at home, create a chain reaction that pours something (a box of cereal, a cup of water, a bucket of sand, etc.). Your goal is to use as many chain reactions, and include as many simple machines as you can to accomplish this task.

Activity Steps

Use the Design Process to help you plan. Do a quick search online "Design Process" and work through each of the five steps.

Inspiration

Check out some videos or do a little research on Rube Goldberg Machines and chain reactions!

Solve a Problem

Decide what problem you want to solve, in this case, your problem is given: Pour something.

Gather Supplies

Gather supplies from around your house. Start with the basics and then see what you can add.

Build your machine!

As you explore chain reactions, consider anything that tips over something else. See how many simple machines you can use in the process.

Tips for Success

- It's ok to fail! Celebrate it as part of the process
- Sometimes simple is better
- Have fun!



Reflection:

- What other simple problems could you solve?
- What materials could you use?
- What worked? What didn't? How did you or could you fix it?
- How did you problem solve?
- Did you work alone or with others? If you worked with others, how did you ensure everyone's ideas were used?

Need more of a challenge? Ask yourself more questions: How long can you make it go? Can you get it to open a door? Close a door? How about pouring cereal AND milk...
