Welcome new 4-H Members. We hope that you will enjoy the upcoming 4-H year and get the most out of it that you can! Here are some of the first things that new and re-enrolling members should do to start the year off on a strong note:

- \* Attend all club meetings that you can. Club meetings are important for staying up-to-date on what is going on in the 4-H world. It is highly encouraged to participate in as many meetings as you can. In Burnett County 4-H we aim for "fit" between you and your 4-H club.
  - Does it meet at a day/time that works for you?
  - \* Do you have things in common with the members?
  - \* Does the club meet at a location that works for you? If you answered "no" to some of these questions, please reach out to me and I can help you find a different club.
- Choose and start projects now. Depending on your grade, you may have 2, 3, or 4 projects. First year members only need 2 projects regardless of their grade. Ask your club leader if the club selected a project to explore together. If you are a Cloverbud (K-2nd grade), sign up for the Cloverbud project.
- Start to keep records for the year in a record book. Record books can be picked up at the UW-Extension office or printed from the website

https://burnett.extension.wisc.edu/4-h-youth-development/for-members/member-forms/. Record books are a great way to keep track of all the great things you are doing in 4-H. Green binders are available for members to use. Cloverbud materials and black binders are available for pickup at the Extension Office.

If you want to be added to the photographer pool, please email Joanne Walen (joanne@wis4hfoundation.org) your name, email address, phone number and the counties where you are willing to work. If you're not a photographer, you can help by sharing this information with adult volunteers who may be interested in providing photography services.

When there is a 4-H activity in a county where a photographer is willing to work, a program person will reach out with specifics (date, time, location, etc.).

Photos must be taken with a quality digital camera and must focus primarily on youth who are actively participating in a 4-H activity. Including the 4-H clover or other 4-H identifier (youth wearing 4-H clothing, background banners with the clover readily visible, signage or flags with the clover in the photo, etc.) is critical as we want photos clearly telling a 4-H story.

After the the event, the photographer will contact the 4-H Foundation to get photo download information. The Foundation will also request photographer contact information as we will be providing a small stipend to the photographer in appreciation of their work. Note that the photos submitted to the 4-H Foundation become the property of the Foundation and no photographer acknowledgements will be provided when photos are used.

To add additional family members, click on the Add Member button on your family member screen. If you are a returning family, start with Logging in to an Existing 4-H Online Account on page 2. To reenroll any existing adult or youth member, click on the Enroll Now link for the member on your family member list screen. Instructions for reenrolling a youth start on page 7 and instructions for adults on page 11.

\*Family can be a household or recognized outside group (classroom, partner organization, etc.)

#### TIPS:

Enter your child's grade for the 2022-23 school year. Complete the health information. Complete special accommodations if needed. When choosing projects, think BIG! Choose any and all projects that interest you!

EMAILS: Please be sure to select that you wish to receive email communication. If you are not reading our weekly county emails and periodic state emails, you will miss a lot of important information! If you do not have email, be sure to ask someone from your club to pass info on to you.

VOLUNTEER BACKGROUND CHECKS: Volunteers are prompted during the online reenrollment process to renew their background check every 4 years. Volunteers that register as a Program Volunteer / Overnight / Chaperone are prompted to renew every 2 years. PLEASE FOLLOW THROUGH WITH THE BACKGROUND CHECK PROMPTS AND EMAILS. You will not be able to be approved until background checks are completed. DON'T HAVE ONLINE ACCESS? # Judging Guidelines Theme: "Opportunities 4 All"

Conveys a message: A viewer leaving the exhibit knows something about a 4-H club, UW-Madison, Division of Extension, community service, etc., that they might not have known before. The message should be clear. Visit the National 4-H Week website for more details/ideas: <a href="https://4-h.org/professionals/marketing-resources/4-h-week-toolkit/">https://4-h.org/professionals/marketing-resources/4-h-week-toolkit/</a>

Attracts Attention: Attracts favorable attention to the display.

Design: Elements of the exhibit are placed effectively to give the window a complete and finished look. The message should be a part of the design.

Attracts Interest: The display encourages viewers to seek additional information. Display appeals to the intended audience. Workmanship: Neat and well constructed though not necessarily expensive. Originality: Evidence of creative thought.

#### Criteria:

- Must positively promote 4-H and be creative.
- Must be visible 24/7 (if business in not open 24/7, the display must be in a window)
- Must contain contact information, including the Extension Burnett County phone number (715-349-2151).
- Must have the club name visible.
- Must be up NO LATER than 12:00 p.m. the day prior to the beginning of National 4-H Week and remain up through the last day of the week (Saturday).
- The 4-H Emblem shall appear whole and not covered by other objects. The tail must point to the right. This is a federal law.

- All clubs are encouraged to bring a large ensemble, as it builds club cohesiveness.
- Individual and group performances are limited to three minutes, except for grades 9-13, who are limited to five
  minutes. Advanced piano performers are allotted five minutes. Points will be deducted if contestant goes over the
  time limit.
- Each individual/ group entry should consist of one musical selection.
- Each instrumental and piano performer must provide the judge a copy of the music they are performing.
- Voice over tapes or CDs are allowed but strongly discouraged. Please try to use an accompanist or background
  music tape or CD. If the singer must use a voice over recording, the singer will need to use a microphone to have
  his/her voice heard over that of the recorded performer.
- In all divisions, appearance and stage presence will count as part of your score. Remember to dress so that you look your best!
- See back for judging criteria.
- Monetary awards will be given to 1<sup>st</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> place.

### Things to do before club meetings

Compiled by Sarah Staude, 4-H Youth Specialist, Missouri Center for Youth Development Brown Bag Guessing: Put common objects in brown bags and have them lined up on a table. Members can try to guess what they are by feeling the bags. You could have a prize for the person that go the most right. People Bingo: Have a bingo sheet where people have to sign in spaces that fit them. Examples: someone who was born in a different county, someone who has traveled to Europe, etc. Highlight Projects: Choose a project each month to do a working demonstration. A working demonstration is one where people can get involved. Make sure that the project leader understands that they need to be there early and have materials for all club members to "try" something. Examples: identify breeds of livestock, try using pastry bag to decorate with icing, properly measuring a cup of flour or water, etc. □ What do you think?: Have a question on a large piece of paper or cardboard. Have a stack of post it notes and ask members to write reactions or answers to the questions on the small notes and post them near the questions. This is a great way to get some new ides for club meetings and events. □ Word Search: Make up a word search just for your club. You could even have a new word search each month. Check out this website where they do it all for you. https://www.education.com/worksheet-generator/reading/word-search/ □ What is it?: Take close up pictures of commonly used items for a project or group of projects. Cut out one section of the photo and see if kids can guess what the photo is of, and in turn what project the photo would be used in. □ What words are in the word…: Find a long word that you can make other words from, a good example would be the name of the club president or even your clubs name. Write the name on the board and give each person a sheet of paper and see how many smaller words they can make out of the big word. Crafts and Cards: At the beginning of each meeting have items for members to make. Easy ideas are cards for nursing homes, or even cards for Mother's Day, Christmas, Valentine's Day, etc. that they can take home. Also have a small craft if appropriate, plant a flower for May Day, decorate cookies for Christmas, etc. Some of the activities will even double as community service. About Another Member: Give each member a roster of club members and tell them to find out something specific about the people on the list. Ideas are middle names, favorite color, favorite teacher, parents names, one project they are in, etc. Great way to get them to know each other. □ Board Games and Puzzles: Put together a collection of board games and puzzles that members can work on before the meeting. If you meet somewhere that you can keep things up buy a large puzzle for the facility that everyone who visits can work on. When you are done you can glue it together and add it as a wall hanging. □ Build a Card House: Have a deck of cards available and have the group work to build a house of cards. You could also do this with legos. Playdough Masterpieces: Have a theme at the meeting and some playdough and have people design something related to the theme. Example...if the theme is your favorite project, member can create something related to their favorite project. At the end you could vote for your favorite or have everyone guess which project the creations go with. □ Baby Photos: Ask club members or leaders to bring their baby photos to a meeting. At the next

meeting have them up and see if you can guess whose photos they are.
