Research by Andrea Caputo in 2015 published in Europe's Journal of Psychology has shown that gratitude is associated with an increase in happiness and life satisfaction. It also has potential benefits for promoting social bonds and increasing or maintaining relationships.

Helping youth notice gratitude and express appreciation can build a habit of noticing what they have and value around them versus focusing on frustrations or disappointments. This practice can positively impact daily life and provide benefits when life brings challenges and resilience is needed.

Whether you are a new or returning family*, this guide will help you through enrolling in Wisconsin 4-H. Please read this page for a summary of the steps needed to enroll. If you are a **new family**, start with Creating a New 4-H Online Account on page 3. After you create your login account, you will be prompted to Add a New Member to the Family right away. To add additional family members, click on the Add Member button on your family member screen. If you are a returning family, start with Logging in to an Existing 4-H Online Account on page 2. To reenroll any existing adult or youth member, click on the Enroll Now link for the member on your family member list screen. Instructions for reenrolling a youth start on page 7 and instructions for adults on page 11.

*Family can be a household or recognized outside group (classroom, partner organization, etc.)

TIPS:

Enter your child's grade for the 2022-23 school year. Complete the health information. Complete special accommodations if needed. When choosing projects, think BIG! Choose any and all projects that interest you!

EMAILS: Please be sure to select that you wish to receive email communication. If you are not reading our weekly county emails and periodic state emails, you will miss a lot of important information! If you do not have email, be sure to ask someone from your club to pass info on to you.

VOLUNTEER BACKGROUND CHECKS: Volunteers are prompted during the online reenrollment process to renew their background check every 4 years. Volunteers that register as a Program Volunteer / Overnight / Chaperone are prompted to renew every 2 years. PLEASE FOLLOW THROUGH WITH THE BACKGROUND CHECK PROMPTS AND EMAILS. You will not be able to be approved until background checks are completed.

WI 4-H Policy on Sledding, Tubing, & Tobogganing

If your club plans to engage in sledding of any kind, please contact Beth (beth.rank@wisc.edu or 608-347-6994) to discuss the need for an American Income Life Event Insurance policy. Depending on the location of your event, she may also need to visually inspect the hill as well.

4-H volunteers must discuss the activity with participants to assess risk and ensure controls are in place to reduce or eliminate the potential for injuries and hazards. In addition, these policies must be followed:

- 4-H sledding and/or tubing activities must take place on a hill designated by a local municipality or other government entity as approved for that purpose or on the premises of a "ski area operator" as defined in Wisconsin Statute 167.33 OR at a hill that can meet all the relevant safety standards listed below and is approved by the 4-H Program Educator. A visual inspection at the site of the hill must take place prior to approval.
 - ☐ Participants may not ride near roads, wooded areas, or bodies of water.
 - ☐ Ensure the path is clear of rocks, sticks, poles, ice, permanent obstacles, and other potential hazards.
- 4-H volunteers must check and monitor weather conditions prior to and during the activity, as weather affects speed, visibility, and the possibility of frostbite or hypothermia.
- Appropriate clothing must be worn for participant safety.
- Sleds and tubes may not be pulled behind a motor vehicle.
- During sledding, the 4-H club or group will designate a leader/volunteer to supervise the hill and be within sight and sound of all participants, unless provided by a rented or contracted facility. The 4-H volunteers should review how to load and unload from the tow rope (if appropriate), stopping the tube, and awareness of other riders

WI 4-H Policy on Swimming

Another common wintertime activity 4-H clubs may vote to participate in for recreation is swimming at local pools. This is a fun activity. We want everyone to stay safe so they can have as much fun as possible.

- □ Lifeguards are required when youth are participating in swimming-related 4-H activities.
- □ Lifeguards must be certified.
- □ A lifeguard must be at least 16-years-old and have the appropriate current certification (Lifeguard Training, First Aid, and CPR/AED).
- □ Beach lifeguards need to have water safety instructor certification from the American Red Cross or equivalent instruction.
- ☐ One lifeguard is needed for every 25 people in the water.
- One adult (not necessarily lifeguard certified) for every 10 youth is needed for overall supervision.
- ☐ Best practice is to swim where lifeguards are provided by the facility or site.

WI 4-H Policy on Trampolines

Although trampoline parks can be tons of fun, please refrain from participating in these activities when you are in a 4-H role (member, volunteer, etc.). It is strictly not allowed.

The use of trampolines (including trampolines at trampoline parks) is <u>not</u> an approved 4-H activity.

RULES AND GUIDELINES

- Each 4-H member may perform in two events in divisions A-E either as an individual or group in addition to club performance. Example: group vocal (Division D) and group instrumental (Division A) and your club's performance OR Individual piano and group vocal and your club's performance. An entrant cannot perform a group vocal with two 4-Hers and a group yocal with two different 4-Hers as he/she would be competing against himself/herself.
- All clubs are encouraged to bring a large ensemble, as it builds club cohesiveness.
- Individual and group performances are limited to three minutes, except for grades 9-13, who are limited to five
 minutes. Advanced piano performers are allotted five minutes. Points will be deducted if contestant goes over the
 time limit.
- Each individual/ group entry should consist of one musical selection.
- Each instrumental and piano performer must provide the judge a copy of the music they are performing.
- Voice over tapes or CDs are allowed but strongly discouraged. Please try to use an accompanist or background
 music tape or CD. If the singer must use a voice over recording, the singer will need to use a microphone to have
 his/her voice heard over that of the recorded performer.
- In all divisions, appearance and stage presence will count as part of your score. Remember to dress so that you look your best!
- See back for judging criteria.
- Monetary awards will be given to 1st-4th place.
