By completing and submitting a Record Book, you become eligible for awards at the Achievement Celebration in November and if you are old enough, you may be selected to receive scholarships to attend educational experiences outside Burnett County. See pictures in this newsletter from the November Achievement Celebration to get an idea of what you might be able to receive.

If you are a new member, or haven't yet received one, the office has a 3-ring binder for you to use to hold your Record Book. Cloverbuds get a1" black binder and members 3rd grade and up get a 2" green binder. Please contact Tammy in Land Services Department to make arrangements to pick one up.

Record Book forms for members 3rd grade and up are available to be printed and picked up or on our website. https://burnett.extension.wisc.edu/4-h-youth-development/for-members/member-forms/#RecordBooks. I'm still looking in to having them converted as a whole document to Google Docs to make it easier to complete them on the computer.

Cloverbuds are direct mailed the Cloverbud Record Book upon enrollment in 4-H. The Cloverbud Record Book contains activities to do throughout the year and they must complete the first few pages of the book and 6 activities and turn it in to be eligible for the Outstanding Cloverbud Award at Achievement Celebration.

Food & Clothing Revue

The Tri-County Food & Clothing Revue will be on Sunday, April 23, 2023 at the Shell Lake School Commons & Auditorium starting at 1pm. Registration is open in 4-HOnline and will remain open until the registration deadline, April 1st. This event is open to anyone in Food & Nutrition, Clothing, Knitting, or Crocheting projects.

What is the Foods Revue?

The Foods Revue gives participants the opportunity for youth to showcase a food related activity or experiment and discuss the results; and to show off their creative table setting skills (if you've ever dreamed of owning or designing a restaurant, this event is for you!). There are two ways to participate.

Action Exhibit/demonstration: Select food activity or experiment and set up as an action exhibit.

Table Setting: Display a complete place setting of a nutritious meal or snack, displaying one prepared food and a menu. Themes are encouraged!

What is an Action Exhibit? An action Exhibit is a demonstration related to food. It can be a demonstration about how to make something. It can be a food related science experiment. It can be a demonstration about food safety. As long as it relates to food and is an engaging demonstration, it works!

What is a Table Setting? A table setting is a great way to express your creativity. Youth create a single place setting based around a theme. They also prepare a single dish that fits the theme for the judge to try. Additionally, youth prepare:

- ☐ Recipe card, with the recipe of the food you prepared.
- □ A complete menu (as if you were serving a full meal)
- One complete table setting and centerpiece (arranged in an attractive display)
- Your prepared food product (Bring only one prepared food) and proper utensil to serve your food (the judge will try this)

Reach out to Beth to see the sample score sheet to help you prepare for Foods Revue. Your

display will be judged Face to Face and you will receive a ribbon. Special Awards may be given.

What is the Clothing Revue?

The purpose of the 4-H Clothing revue is to give Clothing, Knitting, and Crocheting project members the opportunity to show off the wearable items they have made!

Youth will model the outfit they made then receive constructive feedback on the overall look from a judge (reach out to Beth to see judging sheet for criteria). This is less about clothing construction and instead focuses more on how to items fits the person. Members can make items for themselves or others to model.

The Garment Description forms need to be turned in prior to the event, or can be sent with registration.

The purpose of the 4-H Clothing Revue is to put the spotlight on youth sewing, knitting, and crocheting. They are scored on the overall look of the outfit(s) they have sewn.

Both events are considered pre-fair events and if included in your Fair Entry submission prior to the fair and create a poster about the experience, you can get both 4-H Adult Leaders' premiums AND Fair premiums!!

Also, Foods & Nutrition members who have been in the project for two years may be eligible to receive the Foods Award at Achievement Celebration if they participate in the Foods Revue.

Summer Academy

Here is an exciting new twist on the old 4-H & Youth Conference. Summer Academy will be focused on youth sparks and has seven different tracks to select from. Each year's tracks will be slightly different, so attending yearly while youth are eligible is an option. It's worth checking out for only \$350 for a four-day, three-night conference in Madison.

Please note: there will NOT be a Discover Wisconsin Experience in 2022. The decision has been made that this be a biannual experience. We want to encourage youth to explore the Summer Academy if they are eligible.

Registration in 4-HOnline for Summer Academy opens April 1st (no foolin'!) Transportation will be provided (possibly from Amery or Eau Claire).

Wildlife & Woods Virtual Classes

Wildlife and Woods is Wisconsin 4-H's statewide natural sciences, wildlife, and forestry monthly, virtual event.

Outdoor enthusiasts connect with other 4-H youth of all ages from around the state. Together, we explore the natural world with a special focus on wildlife, wildlife habitats, and trees. Participants learn about wild places across the United States following the 4-H Wildlife Habitat Education Program (WHEP) and the 4-H Forestry Program. Materials are designed for all ages and knowledge levels, so everyone can benefit. Since the sessions are co-presenter by youth and adult leaders, the youth leadership opportunities are plentiful.

Youth leaders research about wildlife, trees, management concepts and management practices; prepare slides; lead activities; present topics from slides; record videos; or read announcements. Youth leaders also meet virtually the week before for prep and practice. Being a part of this team is great preparation for WHEP and Forestry competitions. Share-a-Kid Information

Each year, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association promotes interest in dairy goats in our state. One of the ways we encourage our young people in this aspect of agriculture is through our Share-a-Kid Program. We award an average of 4 to 6 dairy goat kids to young people across the state each year. This is a competitive statewide contest. The youth applicant will write an essay of 100 words or more about why they would like to have a dairy goat, how they are going to take care of her (food, shelter, and medical care), and if they have ever raised a goat. We also want to know why they want to raise a goat and what they love about goats. If the youth is new to raising goats, please include who your mentor is. This is a very competitive contest, and we want you to put a lot of effort into your essay. Spelling and content count. The essay can include drawings, photos, or anything special things that you would like to include. Please keep a copy of your essay because no essays will be returned. If you are selected as a winner of a kid, your essay will be given to the donor. While we make every attempt to award winners one of their breeds of choice, if those breeds are not available, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association reserves the right to offer another breed to the winner. Sharea-Kid winners are not required to give a doe kid back to the program, but we encourage them to do so.

The deadline to submit your application/essay is by no later than April 1, 2023. All applicants will be notified of results by no later than May 1st, 2023. National 4-H Hall of Fame

Wisconsin 4-H has an annual opportunity to nominate an individual for recognition to the National 4-H Hall of Fame sponsored by NAE4-HYDP, in cooperation with the National 4-H Council and 4-H National Headquarters for the Class of 2023.

The National 4-H Hall of Fame honors 4-H volunteers, Extension staff and retirees, donors and others who have made a significant impact on the 4-H program and/or 4-H members through the contribution of time, energy, financial

resources, etc. Each state can submit one nominee for consideration at the National level. Nominations are now being accepted for the Wisconsin selection process. The nomination is limited to a one-page Word document with margins of no less than .5 inch and fonts no smaller than 12 point. The nomination document should focus on citizenship, leadership, career, and character of the nominee. The attached nomination form should also be submitted with the signature of the nominator.

The Wisconsin 4-H Hall of Fame Committee conducts the selection process for our state's nominee. The national selection process involves a committee of 18 people, including eight NAE4-HYDP members (2 from each region), representatives of 4-H National Headquarters and National 4-H Council, a past NAE4-HYDP president, a State 4-H Leader, four Hall of Fame laureates and two youth representatives.

The National 4-H Hall of Fame Committee anticipates that 14-16 laureates will be inducted into the Class of 2023. The ceremony is tentatively scheduled for October in Washington DC.

Current employees of 4-H, Cooperative Extension, the Federal Extension System or National 4-H Council and those with 4-H or Extension administrative responsibilities will not be considered until three years following retirement. The three-year rule also applies to deceased employees. Unsuccessful candidates must be re-nominated for future consideration. Please consider nominees for the 2023 Class of Laureates. The nomination information and form are below. Return your nomination including the criteria document to Laura Pine Ipine@wisc.edu by February 1, 2023 for review and consideration by the WI 4-H Hall of Fame Committee.

p.m. Interested adults who are not already active 4-H Leaders should contact their county UW-Extension 4-H Office as soon as possible for assistance in completing the process to become a volunteer. The process involves Volunteer in Preparation (VIP), Title IX, Mandated Reporter, and Building Safe Spaces (BSS) Trainings and a Background Check.

The \$125.00 per person fee for youth and \$75.00 per person fee for adults will include all materials and supplies (including a very cool ArtBEAT! backpack), overnight lodging, and meals.
