

A Note from the Educator -

Beth Rank

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4-H has a unique culture that can be quite confusing for adults and youth who are new to the program. We can take steps, however, to break down cultural barriers that may be present so that the 4-H program is seen as a more welcoming, inclusive organization. Culture includes:

- Expectations for member's behavior (spoken or unspoken)
- Rules, rituals, and language
- · Set of commonly held beliefs and attitudes

Culture helps define who we are and creates a sense of belonging for those who understand and are familiar with it.

However, culture can also be a barrier to expanding the program. People unfamiliar with the rules and rituals of the group appear as outsiders ... and feel like outsiders.

4-H Culture should include

- a positive relationship with a caring adult
- a warm, friendly environment
- opportunities to master skills
- opportunities for youth to fully participate
- and chances to provide service to others.

Techniques to overcome barriers during 4-H meetings include:

- posting words to the 4-H Pledge
- distributing agendas
- seeking new member input
- providing volunteer and officer contact information
- welcoming new members openly

The 4-H culture provides a unique bonding opportunity. We need to remember that the unity we feel may keep others from feeling welcome. Bringing new members to our shared experience should always be a goal.

Food & Clothing Revue

The Tri-County Food & Clothing Revue will be on Sunday, April 23, 2023 at the Shell Lake School Commons & Auditorium starting at 1pm. Registration is open in 4-HOnline and will remain open until the <u>registration deadline, April 3rd in</u> <u>4-HOnline</u> This event is open to anyone in Food & Nutrition, Clothing, Knitting, or Crocheting projects.

What is the Foods Revue?

The Foods Revue gives participants the opportunity for youth to showcase a food related activity or experiment and discuss the results; and to show off their creative table setting skills (if you've ever dreamed of owning or designing a restaurant, this event is for you!). There are two ways to participate.

Action Exhibit/demonstration: Select food activity or experiment and set up as an action exhibit.

Table Setting: Display a complete place setting of a nutritious meal or snack, displaying one prepared food and a menu. Themes are encouraged!

- What is an Action Exhibit? An action Exhibit is a demonstration related to food. It can be a demonstration about how to make something. It can be a food related science experiment. It can be a demonstration about food safety. As long as it relates to food and is an engaging demonstration, it works!
- What is a Table Setting? A table setting is a great way to express your creativity. Youth create a single place setting based around a theme. They also prepare a single dish that fits the theme for the judge to
 - try. Additionally, youth prepare:
 - Recipe card, with the recipe of the food you prepared.
 - □ A complete menu (as if you were serving a full meal)
 - One complete table setting and centerpiece (arranged in an attractive display)
 - Your prepared food product (Bring only one prepared food) and proper utensil to serve your food (the judge will try this)

Reach out to Beth to see the sample score sheet to help you prepare for Foods Revue. Your display will be judged Face to Face and you will receive a ribbon. Special Awards may be given.

What is the Clothing Revue?

The purpose of the 4-H Clothing revue is to give Clothing, Knitting, and Crocheting project members the opportunity to show off the wearable items they have made!

Youth will model the outfit they made then receive constructive feedback on the overall look from a judge (reach out to Beth to see judging sheet for criteria). This is less about clothing construction and instead focuses more on how to items fits the person. Members can make items for themselves or others to model.

The Garment Description forms need to be turned in prior to the event, or can be sent with registration.

The purpose of the 4-H Clothing Revue is to put the spotlight on youth sewing, knitting, and crocheting. They are scored on the overall look of the outfit(s) they have sewn.

Both events are considered pre-fair events and if included in your Fair Entry submission prior to the fair and create a poster about the experience, you can get both 4-H Adult Leaders' premiums AND Fair premiums!!

Also, Foods & Nutrition members who have been in the project for two years may be eligible to receive the Foods Award at Achievement Celebration if they participate in the Foods Revue.

Ag Society Fair Updates for 2023

• The Burnett County Ag Society Fair is preparing now and wants to spread the word that they will be using the Fair Entry system at the 2023 fair. Fair entries will be submitted through 4-HOnline for enrolled 4-H members and non-4-H youth and adults will need to create an account online to enter their items for the fair. The Fair entry deadline (2 weeks prior to the fair) will be firm this year to give Coke and Bruce enough time to prepare everything using the new system.

- Entry tags will be available on Wednesday night of fair week. Fair tags will have a barcode and there will be scanners used to check in, during judging, and at check out for all entries.

- The fair will be replacing the rabbit and chicken cages in that barn thanks to a grant from Compeer Financial. If you have any suggestions for good cages, please email Fairboard at gburgfair@gmail.com
- The fair would like 4-H to help promote the fair. They want to create a sign contest. The fair will provide the 4'x8' sheet of plywood and paint for each club. Participating clubs would make a sign and put it up on a major Burnett Co Hwy one month before the fair. The sign must contain:
 - Fair name
 - 4-H club name
 - Fair dates
 - Fair theme

Voting for prizes will take place during the fair using photos of each sign. It will be a people's choice contest. For more information, contact the fair board.

- Kids Day at the Fair (Saturday) is looking for a few clubs or projects to organize activities. The fair has someone to sponsor a milk drinking contest but needs help running it. They are very open to ideas and have funds available to increase the number of kids who come to the fair.
- Fair Food Stand will be operated in a similar way as 2022 with the same people coordinating it.

Wildlife & Woods Virtual

Classes

Wildlife and Woods is Wisconsin 4-H's statewide natural sciences, wildlife, and forestry monthly, virtual event.

Outdoor enthusiasts connect with other 4-H youth of all ages from around the state. Together, we explore the natural world with a special focus on wildlife, wildlife habitats, and trees. Participants learn about wild places across the United States

following the 4-H Wildlife Habitat Education Program (WHEP) and the 4-H Forestry Program. Materials are designed for all ages and knowledge levels, so everyone can benefit. Since the sessions are co-presenter by youth and adult leaders, the youth leadership opportunities are plentiful.

Youth leaders research about wildlife, trees, management concepts and management practices; prepare slides; lead activities; present topics from slides; record videos; or read announcements. Youth leaders also meet virtually the week before for prep and practice. Being a part of this team is great preparation for WHEP and Forestry competitions. Easter Egg Food Safety

If dyeing Easter eggs is a tradition in your family, make sure to keep food safety in mind as you carry out your annual ritual. Eggs can contain bacteria such as *Salmonella*. Make sure you are handling your eggs correctly, keeping them stored in the refrigerator until ready to use, and following good hand washing practices before and after handling the eggs. If you wish to eat the eggs after dyeing them or hiding them, then you must follow good food safety and food storage practices. The Partnership for Food Safety Education provides the following tips for keeping your Easter eggs safe:

- Only use eggs that have been refrigerated, and discard eggs that are cracked or dirty.
- Be sure to use food-grade dyes. It is safe to use commercial egg dyes, liquid food coloring, and fruit-drink powders. When handling eggs, be careful not to crack them. Otherwise, bacteria could enter the egg through the cracks in the shell.
- Keep hard-cooked eggs chilled on a shelf inside the refrigerator. Be sure your refrigerator is 40°F or less by using a refrigerator thermometer.
- Hide the eggs in places that are protected from dirt, pets and other potential sources of bacteria.
- Remember the two-hour rule. Eggs should only be out of the refrigerator for a maximum of two hours. Make sure the "found" eggs are back in the refrigerator or consumed within two hours.
- Remember that hard-boiled eggs are only safe to eat for one week after cooking.

Red Beet Eggs

- 1 cup red beet juice (from canned beets)
- 1½ cups cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- a few canned whole tiny red beets (or several slices of beets can be used)

Dilled Eggs

- 1½ cups white vinegar
- 1 cup water
- ¾ teaspoon dill weed
- ¼ teaspoon white pepper
- 3 teaspoons salt
- ¼ teaspoon mustard seed
- ½ teaspoon onion juice or minced onion
- ½ teaspoon minced garlic or 1 peeled garlic clove

Cidered Eggs

- 1½ cups pasteurized sweet apple cider or apple juice
- ½ cup white vinegar
- 6 thin slices of onion
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon whole pickling spice
- 1 peeled garlic clove
